faith and lay hold on eternal life which is given unto me by God Himself on the day I gladly received Christ Jesus. I must fight against covetousness. Will I always succeed? No. Will I perfectly eliminate it? No. But the real issue is I must fight it. The real issue is I can't treat covetousness as nothing. The real issue is I determine to battle against it.

The writer of the Hebrews says, "Let your conversation be without covetousness; and be content with such things as ye have: for he hath said, I will never leave thee, nor forsake thee. 6 So that we may boldly say, The Lord is my helper, and I will not fear what man shall do unto me" (Hebrews 13:5–6). Wow, what a promise!

When I'm tempted to covet, I resolve to battle against it with the words of the Apostle Paul, "Not that I speak in respect of want: for I have learned, in whatsoever state I am, *therewith* **to be content**. ¹² I know both how to be abased, and I know how to abound: every where and in all things I am instructed both to be full and to be hungry, both to abound and to suffer need. ¹³ I can do all things **through Christ** which strengtheneth me" (Philippians 4:11–13).

This is the way of life that I am still learning. We hope, we pray, we join together in our daily battles. At the fundamental level, our daily battle is a battle against unbelief in the word of God. So let us wipe away the mud that blurs our eyes and **get washed up by the water of the word of God**. Keep our eyes fixed on the precious and very great promises of God.



WHEN I AM TEMPTED TO COVET

WHEN I FEEL THE URGE TO

GOVET, I fight the good fight of faith with the promise of God in 1 Timothy that "godliness with contentment is great gain. ⁷ For we brought nothing into this world, and it is certain we can carry nothing out. ⁸ And having food and raiment let us be therewith content. ⁹ But they that will be rich fall into temptation and a snare, and *into* many foolish and hurtful lusts, which drown men in destruction and perdition" (6:6-9).

It is my responsibility to remind myself that His word is powerful to give me escape from the temptation of covetousness because "his divine power hath given unto us all things that pertain unto life and godliness" (2 Pe 1:3). This is an astounding statement! God has given me everything necessary for how I live my life and how to grow in godliness!

I am reminded that *covetousness never brings true satisfaction*. "He that loveth silver shall not be satisfied with silver; nor he that loveth abundance with increase: this *is* also vanity" (Ecclesiastes 5:10). I am admonished by Jesus Christ Himself that *covetousness chokes off spiritual life*. The thorns choking off the Word of God which is for my spiritual life are "the cares of this world, and the deceitfulness of riches, and the lusts of other things" (Mk 4:19). I am given a warning that *covetousness produces many other sins*. It can be like a fish which spawns a multitude of eggs in the water.

When I feel the ugly desire of covetousness, I fight the good fight of faith with the words of the inspired Apostle that, "For the love of money is the root of all evil: which while some coveted after, they have erred from the faith, and pierced themselves through with many sorrows" (1 Timothy 6:10).

I am reproved that covetousness lets me down when I need help most. "For we brought nothing into this world, and it is certain we can carry nothing out. 8 And having food and raiment let us be therewith content" (1 Timothy 6:7-8).

I am corrected that *covetousness destroys the soul.* "But they that will be rich fall into temptation and a snare, and *into* many foolish and hurtful lusts, which drown men in destruction and perdition" (1 Timothy 6:9). The Apostle Paul is not just talking about financial destruction or a material downfall, he's talking about laying hold on eternal life—"Fight the good fight of faith, lay hold on eternal life, whereunto thou art also called, and hast professed a good profession before many witnesses" (1 Timothy 6:12).

This is why I must fight covetousness—because what's at stake is eternal life. If I, who profess Christ, can't control covetousness, and all throughout my life, there is a consistent covetousness shown in my life, then my profession of Christ is false. A true Christian has been given the power to conquer sin. This is not triumphalism or prosperity gospel. This is biblical doctrine. I fight the good fight of
